The Pastor's Report

Howdy,

Frost on the pumpkin, the smell of hot cider, and little ghosts & goblins soon to be canvassing the streets! I love October! Crisp, cool days, football games & the explosion of color on the trees. This is the month I always get the notion it is time to take seriously the winter which is to come.

Fall is a time of change. The past few weeks I've been marking the passing of time as I pick out one or two of my favorite trees in the park across from the manse and notice, each day, the subtle changes in color and the increasingly fewer leaves on the branches. I can't help but wonder if for some this isn't the way our church is viewed? Over the past few years we've lost some of our most colorful leaves off of the tree which is this church. And among the many leaves still on our trees, dramatic changes are taking place as friends retire, or move, or simply stop doing some of the things they once had done. Although we have increasingly more young families, in many respects ours still continues to be an aging congregation. Whereas one might be tempted to see this as a concern for a church that wants to grow, I would instead encourage us to see our congregation's relative age as an asset to strengthen us.

In the books of Proverbs, Ecclesiastes and the Apocryphal book Wisdom of Solomon we find "wisdom" portrayed as a creative attribute of God, and a gift of God through whose virtues one is able to live well; both succeeding and counseling success.

A gift of God given by virtue of which one is able to live well and both succeed and counsel success - that is what we have here in the collective wisdom of our congregation. In our church on the Park we have a tremendous amount of accumulated knowledge, experience and wisdom - literally centuries worth. Only by fostering these virtues can we fashion our future in a way that allows to both "succeed and counsel success."

What I would ask this month, is that if you are on the wiser side of things you step in and lend a hand or word of advice on how or why things can be done a certain way. If you are on the less wise side of things (i.e., a whipper-snapper) give a pause to soak up "what's what" from those that have gone before. This is the season of the harvest, of gathering in the fruits from the bountiful season of growth. We have a bumper crop of wisdom here in our congregation, let's not forget to harvest the fruits of many year's living, and this gift of God to us.

Although she is but one, wisdom can do all things, and while remaining in herself, she renews all things; in every generation she passes into holy souls and makes them friends of God, and prophets; for God loves nothing so much as the person who lives with wisdom.

New Copy Machine

The session has approved the purchase of a new copy machine to be funded through the **Memorial Fund** at a cost of **\$5,555**. The old machine had produced over **1,000,000,000 copies** and was old enough that some spare parts, if needed, would **no longer be available**. Also, due to the age of the machine, the **service contract** (repair and maintenance) was costing us **\$1,500** a year.

The new service contract has been locked in for the next **five years** at a cost of **\$853** a year for a **savings of \$3,253**. The new copier and service contract also includes toner and parts for additional cost savings. Further, the new machine will function as a **scanner** so we can begin to generate **electronic copies of church documents**, and print orders may be sent **directly from a computer** without having to first run off a hard copy on the laser printer; removing a step and **saving wear and tear** on the printer.

The old machine was removed without any disposal costs and any extra toner on hand for the old machine was **refunded**. Not only was this a **wise financial decision** and a **boost to efficiency**, the new machine arrived five days after the old one gave up the ghost.

Church & Community

At the Church & Community Program Annual Meeting on September 8th, the following were elected as the new officers: President, Sharon White, St. Mary's RC; Vice-President, Pat Alden, Unitarian Universalist; Secretary, Jane Fernandes, First Presbyterian; Treasurer, David Geleta, St. Mary's RC; Assitant Treasurer, Elaine Noble, United Methodist.

It was reported by the Director that **230 households** (**700 individuals**) had received **10,260 meals** in August. Pat Sibbitts reported that **85 families** (**195 students**) had been assisted by the distribution of **school supplies** on August 30th. **Hair cuts** and **dental supplies** were also offered this year.

At the Annual Meeting, the past president, **Janet Stitt**, expressed appreciation to, and regret that, **Anne Richey** and **Andrea Smith** of the Unitarian Universalist church had resigned from the Board. She thanked all of the board members for their **leadership** of committees and **faithful attendance** at board meetings. **Carol Linn** was cited for her man-

agement of the Thrift Shop and increasing income from sales. The director, **Ray Crosby** was thanked for his pursuit of



the Walmart grant and the supervision of the makeover.

Those in attendance were reminded that **memorial donations** are gladly received (envelopes for that purpose are available) and are used to bolster the **emergency fund** used to provide immediate assistance when it is sought.

John & Judy Turcotte received the Richard Morrow Humanitarian Award for their volunteer work with the Giving Tree (Christmas program) and also the weekly transportation of food given by Walmart in Potsdam.

Cerebral Palsy Association of the North Country received the first Community Award in appreciation of their provision of a van, staff and clients from one of their residential facilities to assist with the transport of food from WalMart, of Potsdam.

Your continuing donations of peas, corn, carrots and other non-perishable foods are appreciated. New volunteers would be warmly welcomed!

Session Report

The Session met on **August 24th. Thank you notes** from the Daily Ridge Church for our continued support and Unity Church Student Ministry for hosting them during the summer were shared. Rev. Mike officiated at Gordon Theisen & Michelle Roach and Elliott Rodee & Mary Basford's weddings. Pastor Donna felt grateful for having the energy to preach at Brick Chapel during the summer. Rev. Mike was also grateful that he was able to spend time with his family on their cross-country trip this summer. Positive feedback was heard about Rev. Dr. Michael Phoenix's replacement of Rev. Mike this summer.

Consensus was reached on purchasing a **new copier/scanner** up to \$6,000 for the office. The old one is 10 years old and parts are no longer available for it. **Prayers** were offered for those grieving, in hospital, nursing home, and planned surgeries. Elders were urged to meet and greet any **new folks** that come to church. The use of alcohol in the park for the St. Lawrence International Film Festival was **unanimously denied**. The **bazaar** is scheduled for **October 24th**. The **church band** will suspend performances this year. **Our next meeting is September 28th**.

Presbyterians celebrate the tradition that **grounds their faith** on Reformation Sunday. Held on the last Sunday in October, it marks the occasion in 1517 when **Martin Luther** posted his 95 theses on the church door in Wittenberg, Germany.

This year, the **Presbyterian Historical Society** is commemorating the life and death of **Czech reformer Jan Hus**. More than a century before the start of the Protestant Reformation, Jan Hus paid for his beliefs with his life. Hus taught that the **Bible was the source of all truth**—not popes or other church leaders.

In **1410**, Pope Alexander V attempted to silence Jan Hus by declaring chapels unfit places for preaching. Hus appealed and continued to preach to **huge crowds**, even after his excommunication. When Alexander's successor, Pope John XXIII, banned all religious services in Prague, Hus took refuge in the Bohemian countryside where he continued to **write and preach.**

In 1414, authorities arrested Hus on the Pope's order. Hus said he would recant if the Council could show him where he had erred according to the Bible.

On July 6, 1415, the Council found Jan Hus **guilty of heresy** and sentenced him to death. He was burned at the stake. On his head was a tall, paper hat with an inscription labeling him the leader of a heretical movement. Hus died defending his belief that calls for reform **could be God's will**, even if they challenged powerful religious men.




